Project update

August marked an exciting milestone for Uungula Wind Farm, with the first wind turbine successfully installed on site. It's a significant moment for the project and the result of a huge amount of planning, construction and teamwork across the project team and our contractors.

With turbine components now arriving regularly and installation underway, the wind farm is taking shape across the site. Good progress is also being made on the on-site substation and internal cabling network, with key electrical infrastructure continuing to develop.

We look forward to sharing more construction updates and photos as work progresses across the project in the coming months.

Oversize overmass delivery schedule

All turbine components, including blades, are now being transported to site six days a week, with vehicle departures spaced around 30 minutes apart and supported by NSW Police and pilot vehicles.

We appreciate the patience and cooperation of communities along the transport route while these important deliveries take place.

Together with our principal contractor GE, we discussed emergency access to the site, opportunities for coordinated emergency exercises, and how project resources could potentially support emergency response and neighbouring landowners if required.

These conversations are an important part of ensuring our project team and local emergency services are prepared to work together effectively and maintain a coordinated response should an emergency occur.

What does a typical day look like for you?

As Project Director, part of my day is structured around regular briefing or progress meetings, but apart from that, there is no typical day for me, each day brings its own challenges, e.g. new issues to be tackled, decisions to be made, stakeholders to be contacted and spoken to - all towards the ultimate goal of meeting our safety, quality, power generation, schedule and cost targets.

What are you most proud of about the project so far?

We obviously have some challenges on the project as most projects do, but the thing I'm most proud of is how everyone in the team shows up every day, ready to give it their best. Great capability and positive energy, which is all one could wish for, as the project owner. Very proud.

What is something most people don't know about the Uungula Wind Farm project?

The word Uungula means wind in the hills.

What did you want to be when you were growing up?

I always liked building things from scratch and very early in my career I gravitated towards project management. I just like the feeling of creating tangible projects from blank pieces of paper, and I like coordinating people/ teams involved to give it their best and see them enjoy the sight of a project getting built/ commissioned.

Did you know?

It takes around seven to ten days to complete the installation of a turbine which is made up of a total of 13 major component sections. While individual lifts may only take a few hours, weather conditions, particularly wind speeds, play a major role in determining how quickly a turbine can be completed. Strong winds can delay lifting activities, making turbine installation one of the most weather-dependent stages of construction.
